Their recommendations are:


1. Oval, so it will be simpler to replace on current platforms. ie similar to the current scale and shape of the NAFAS logo.



Fabulous Flowers



Hydrangea

The voluminous flowers of the Hydrangea or Hortensia change colour and age to a beautiful antique shade. The heads are made up of many hundreds of blossoms.

Originating from Eastern Asia and America, they are available from February to December - peaking May to October.

There are two types of Hydrangea - the classic mophead rounded flowers (*Hydrangea macrophylla*), and the lace cap (*Hydrangea paniculate*) which has smaller flowers. They come in a range of colours - pink, blue, lilac, burgundy, white, green, and multi. The hophead hydrangeas will vary in colour depending on your soil - if it's acidic then they will be blue, and if alkaline they will be pink.

They prefer partial shade and shelter, and need loads of water. If you have cut the flower and it starts to wilt, then submerge the head in some water for a few hours and it will revive. They should last 7 to 14 days in fresh water.

It's a fabulous flower to dry, stand the flowers in approx an inch of water, and allow the water to dry out slowly, they will gradually dry out. If the colour fades you can then spray them.

You can make a sweet tea from dried Hydrangea leaves, in Japan they prepare this to celebrate Buddha's birth.



An International Challenge

Recently 17 members of New Visions, as well as two former members, took part in an exciting workshop with **Annette Waller** all the way from Geraldine on the South Island in New Zealand.



I have to say that the one positive to have come out of our long pandemic has been us all getting used to the virtual world and learning to cope with mute buttons and such like. And this of course meant that I was able to look further afield to give our members the opportunity to 'meet' a designer they would normally never get the chance to work with.



Annette comes highly qualified; her first introduction to floral art was at an evening class and she then joined the Geraldine Floral Art Group in 1990. She is now qualified with the FASNZ Diploma of Teaching, the Diploma of Demonstrating and the Practical Judging Unit as well as being part of the FASNZ National Education Committee.

Annette has also competed with success not only at home and in Australia but also at WAFA in Boston and Ireland. She enjoys sharing her passion of flowers, fun and friendship and especially enjoys abstract work along with

contemporary design. Right up our floral street!

She chose to cover the topic of cross-hatching and because of an 11 hour time difference, we held our workshop over two days; the first one on the morning of Saturday 17 July, followed by another session on Monday evening, 19 July.




Annette started by showing us a number of cross-hatching ideas she had created in readiness to demonstrate the versatility of this particular design technique. It is currently winter on South Island (the temp was hovering just below zero) and most designers make do with very limited plant material during the winter months, rarely opting to buy in flowers or foliage. In fact, Annette said that she only had three narcissi growing in her garden that Saturday morning!




The challenge thus for us was to try and stay clear of too many flowers and to try and work with a very limited palette; a bit of a challenge when our own gardens 'are currently bursting with blooms ;-)

Once Annette had finished all her explaining, it was time to get

creative ourselves. Cross-hatching can be secured with PVA glue, hot glue as well as elastic bands or wires and those opting for the cold glue method



did encounter a few problems with drying (albeit that we had plus 25 degrees in the shade that particular day and the heat should have helped!) but this is all part of the learning process... Still, working from home means that you can dip into your workshop/shed/storage corner to get different supplies, as and if required...



I had asked each member taking part to send me a good image of their design once they had completed it and once all were to hand, I




forwarded these to Annette so that she could take a closer look before we reconvened on the Monday evening for the reveal. I had prepared a slide show and I feel that it was a very good way of everyone being

able to see clearly each member's design and to listen to Annette's helpful comments and suggestions.

A thoroughly enjoyable two part workshop which went down very well indeed and which produced some wonderful designs, all of which can be viewed on our Facebook page; www.facebook.com/newvisionsussex.

Book review



Cut and Dry by Carolyn Dunster

Cut and Dry describes it's self as the modern guide to dried flowers from growing to styling, and it is certainly bang up to date. Dried flowers are gaining popularity as a sustainable approach to flower displays. Published in 2021 it really is up to date, so often books on dried flowers are dated, lack illustration and energy. This is certainly not dull and dusty!

Not only flowers and foliage, it covers grasses, herbs, mosses, lichens, seed pods, fruit and vegetables, and exotics.

Beautifully illustrated with colour photos and clear instruction on the best plants for drying, drying techniques, growing, and styling. If that's not enough there are ten projects to inspire you and try for yourself.

This is really a great book, and very topical.

Q Where is your favourite Sussex place?

I honestly don't think I can name one place more dear to me than another. I love the fact that a few miles in one direction I can be at the coast or in the deep countryside or in a beautiful town. I love places like Lewes or Brighton North Laines for poking around the junk shops, I adore the coast line, that we can have all the fun of the fair right through to beautiful isolated beaches and walking on the cliffs near Seaford. I honestly feel really lucky that Sussex has so much to offer.

I met Helen Sharman, a truly inspiring woman who became the first British astronaut. I was quite in awe, especially when I learnt she was one of the team who had developed the Mars choc ice. I mean... how do you freeze ice cream but not the chocolate and the toffee part.. amazing !

My hubby... it's big pink lilies every time!



Pressed and dried

Are you on trend? I'm thrilled to say that pressed and dried flowers are making a comeback!

Our shop in the 80s was groaning with bunches of dried flowers suspended from the ceiling but nearly overnight they went out of fashion. Now this year the trendsetters are scrambling for the best blooms at the wholesalers!

You don't have to own a garden to have a go at creating cards, tags, coasters etc. as weeds and wild flowers are a good source of plant material.

There are, of course, various methods of drying and preserving but I am just mentioning a couple that I love to do.

Air drying - Most importantly harvest your flowers or seed heads on a dry day just before




the bloom is at its most mature as after you have picked them they will carry on ageing and if gathered too late they will disintegrate. Secure small bunches of Poppy-heads, Larkspur, Eryngium, Helipterum etc with elastic bands as stems will shrink when drying. Hang upside down in a dry airy place out of direct sunlight.

Microwave pressing - Some of the most successful flowers for pressing are Larkspur, Calendula, Pansy, Clary and Ammi. They all keep their colour beautifully.

Place flowers or petals between copier paper in an old book and then place in the microwave with something heavy on top. Cook for 1 minute then check progress. If flowers need a little longer then carry on at 1 minute increments. Then the fun really begins.....,
