

A Trip to Cheshire

Four of us, Gaenor, Margaret, Carol and I set off for Runcorn on Tuesday 7 March, where we stayed for two nights so that we could attend the Pre-National Assessments and National Demonstrator Tests organised by the Cheshire Area in nearby Frodsham.

We were made extremely welcome by members of Cheshire Area, the National Demonstrators' Committee and Frodsham & District Flower Club. The event was well attended on both days. Five candidates took the pre-assessment on the Wednesday and a further two candidates on the Thursday. The aim of these assessments is to consider a candidates' potential to take their National Demonstrators test in 12-18 months time. These candidates were from across Flowers North West / Cheshire Area, North Midlands Area, North East Area, Cheshire / Flowers North West / Mercia & North Wales & NIGFAS. There is no pass or fail for these assessments, and candidates would have been given feedback on how they might continue to prepare for a future national demonstrators test.

On the Thursday, in addition to the remaining two pre-assessment candidates, there were four taking the tests to become National demonstrators, from SAFAS & Northumberland & Durham, Cheshire Area / Mercia & North Wales, B.B.& O Area, and Flowers North West. Our congratulations go to Julia Loudon, Dawn Weaver and Sara Barrow for successfully qualifying as National Demonstrators.

It was such a treat to spend two entire days watching some wonderful demonstrators. Whilst those candidates doing their pre-assessment were all accomplished demonstrators in their own right, there was a discernible difference in those candidates who would have completed the pre-national assessment some 12-18 months beforehand and were now aiming to qualify as National demonstrators. Across both days we saw some really stunning designs.

And, as if that was not enough, on the Wednesday evening we attended the regular Frodsham and District Flower Club as visitors,



where we were entertained by Paula Routledge from the North Midlands Area of NAFAS, with her demonstration 'Life is a Ball.' Alongside her wonderful arrangements, Paula explained how with a group of friends they had set up a charity to raise money in memory of a friend who had died too young. Her efforts were recognised with the award of the British Empire Medal in 2021, which she was proud to receive for charitable services to Nottingham, and most recently an invite to the forthcoming coronation. As well as a demonstrator, Paula can also be heard as a gardening broadcaster on BBC Radio Nottingham.

Paula kindly agreed to join us in a group photo with Eleanor Griffiths the chairman of Frodsham & District Flower Club as a record of our visit.

Despite the warning of snow and very unpleasant driving conditions Gaenor delivered us all safely home on Thursday evening. It was a terrific experience. It was my first attendance at a pre-national assessment and National test and I would most definitely attend again.

We met flower club members from all parts of the country who had travelled to support their respective candidates and it was truly an event offering fun, friendship and plenty of flowers.



Sussex Area President's badge

The badge worn by the Sussex Area President is a unique and specially commissioned badge of office.

In the late 1990's Beth Hardcastle was approaching the end of her term of office as President of our Area and she asked me (as the then Chairman of the Area) if she could arrange for a new badge to be her farewell gift to the Area (the existing badge was becoming rather scruffy). She asked me to talk to the Chairmen of the other Areas of

NAFAS to find out how we could go about getting a new badge. This request became quite an interesting project for us and investigations into how a new badge could be made were undertaken.

Eventually the Chairman of the Wessex & Jersey Area (then Judy Sharpe) put me in touch with a lady who was a registered Goldsmith and Designer based in the East of England. Beth was happy that we ask this lady to draw up a design for us but to include the

original NAFAS logo, which proved to be rather problematic. However, we finally purchased a NAFAS Gold Brooch from HQ and it was agreed that this could be incorporated into the specific Sussex Area badge. The Brooch was an expensive item (£155 in 1998)

and additional gold would be needed to provide the framework of the design to complete the badge. However, the designer as a registered Goldsmith was able to purchase the gold for her work.

Detailed drawings were submitted to Beth for her approval and the Area Executive Committee of the time were all delighted that the Area was to receive this very special artistic

and unique hand-crafted badge of office for all future Sussex Area Presidents to wear, it was such a generous and stylish gift.

I always enjoy seeing our current Area President, Sue Seath wearing it.

What a lovely task this has been.

When I was asked to choose my desert island discs my mind went blank and my first thought was would I be able to think of enough pieces of music?


However, I have had a great time just listening to lots of music so that I could choose my six pieces. It has been incredibly hard to choose just six and, far from being short of ideas, I have reminded myself how many pieces of music I actually like.

My taste is eclectic and probably cliched but I make no apologies. If I'm stuck on a desert island I want something to enjoy and to remind me of home and family, cheer me up and soothe me in equal measure.

I have always loved music and had piano lessons from the age of 7, started playing the bassoon at 12 and classical guitar at 16. Life then took over and I have sadly neglected these skills, though I do occasionally still play the piano and guitar (badly however).

My first choice is **Rachmaninov's piano concerto number 2 in C minor**, first movement, op18. This is very rousing and skips along and reminds me of the time our school orchestra played it with me doing my bit at the back on the bassoon. It has been a favourite ever since.

My second choice is by **Dvorak: Largo from the second movement of his New World Symphony** (No9 in D minor). This is a more relaxing piece and I might enjoy it lying on the sandy beach as the sun goes down, after a long day foraging for firewood and food and building or repairing my shelter.



As I wake up the next day, my third choice would be 'Morning' from the Peer Gynt Suite by Greig (as I said, a bit of a cliché!).

Life hasn't all been about classical music though and my university days were full of Elton John, Rod Stewart, The Moody Blues, The Beach Boys, Queen, 10CC, Abba, The Four Seasons, Genesis and many more. So, for my next choice, I would have 'Goodbye Yellow Brick Road' by Elton John as I could sing along, and nobody would be listening!

Choice number 5 would be something played by the Band of the Royal Marines, ideally **Elgar's 'Pomp and Circumstance'**, as a tribute to my husband who was a Royal Marine back in the day and always has it on when doing the ironing – yes, I did say doing the ironing (the Marines trained him well!). Not that I will be doing much ironing on my desert island but it's a cheery piece of music and will help keep my spirits up.

My final choice, again a cliché, would be **Simon and Garfunkel's 'Homeward Bound'** in the hope that rescue is not too far away!

There are so many other pieces of music that I would like to have had with me but that's for my next desert island......

My luxury would be a 'mindful' colouring book and felt pens (I hope that doesn't count as two things as one is no good without the other......)

Logos and emblems

It's all about the use of a logo or emblem, to make this eye catching and relevant to the cause it promotes.

They serve to represent a given organisation or company through a visual image that can be easily understood and recognised. A logo or emblems have been used for centuries, in everything from heraldic family crests and wax seals, to official government badges.


An emblem is a logo type that features text, a symbol, or imagery inside a geometric shape. It features a simple and clear icon and an easy-to-read inscription. The emblem could be on letterheads, posters, clothing, banners, buildings, and a variety of other items. It grabs attention, makes a strong first impression, is the foundation of your identity, is memorable, separates you from other similar organisations, fosters loyalty, and is expected by your audience.

The official emblem for His Majesty's King Charles III's Coronation on 6 May 2023 has been announced. The emblem is created with the

flora of the four nations of the United Kingdom: the rose for

England, the thistle for Scotland, the daffodil for Wales and the shamrock for Northern Ireland. These natural forms combine to describe St Edward's Crown, used for the coronation of British monarchs. The emblem was designed by Sir Jony Ive with his creative collective LoveFrom.

Using the rose, thistle, daffodil and shamrock reminds you of the NAFAS emblem, which also contains those floral items. The NAFAS emblem was first used in the Flower Arranger in June 1966, the result of a competition which started in June 1964. Fifty three entries were received, and this started months of careful consideration and advice from outside experts,



emblems of England (rose), Scotland (thistle), Wales (daffodil) and Ireland (shamrock). Originally circled this

was abandoned in 1975, which made everyone more aware of the spray shape. The emblem has since been refreshed with the

before the result was finally announced. The winners were Major General Brunskill and Mrs Gerald Brunskill, who were at the time the NAFAS Treasurer, and Editor of 'The Flower Arranger'.


The familiar spray combines the national



addition of the oval shape and explanatory words. Appearing on note paper, envelopes, publications, souvenir items etc, any affiliated club, society or area may use it.

Ten stunning stamps, featuring the new silhouette of His Majesty King Charles III, depict some of the most popular flowers to be seen in gardens were released by Royal Mail in March.

The designs feature striking photographs of the flowers against a white background, alongside their common names. Sweet Pea, Iris, Lily, Sunflower, Fuchsia, Tulip, Peony, Nasturtium, Rose, and Dahlia.

The fold-out souvenir pack contains the new set of mint stamps, featuring the colourful images costs £10.50. Gardening writer Naomi Slade writes about the significance of the flowers to the nation and their enduring and evocative presence in our British rituals and traditions.
