


Left to right: Margaret Moores, Sheila and Richard Griffin, Gaenor Circus at October's Area Day


Dromantine

In August, I attended the Judges conference at Dromantine in Northern Ireland with six other Sussex Judges, Angela Merryfield, Brenda Bull, Barbara Hoy, Christina Curtis, Maggie Hayes and Jilly Griffin. The event was well attended by a mix of Area and National Judges.

The weekend proved to be a thoroughly entertaining few days with plenty of fun, friendship and flowers in abundance, topped up with huge amounts of laughter from the moment we arrived. Joan Magee and her team certainly welcomed us all with tremendous Irish



hospitality and everyone was made to feel relaxed and comfortable with the weekend's programme.



We looked at some of the changes in the new 2023 Competition Manual regarding Pedestals and Still life exhibits. Competitors and Judges are advised to purchase and follow the new 2023 manual for future competitions as there are many changes in format and content.

The main change for Pedestal exhibits is that "when more than one placement is used, the main placement MUST be uppermost". Therefore any other placements must be positioned below the main placement and are subsidiary.

With Still Life there is a change of emphasis for the exhibit with the second point. "The integration of all components should elicit a feeling of harmony and stillness". We found that less is certainly more for these designs.

There is a fuller article by Angela giving the flavour of the topics we covered during the weekend.

NAFAS Judges Conference

The NAFAS Judges Conference at last took place in Dromantine, Northern Ireland, on the weekend of 18-20 August 2023. It had been scheduled twice before and both times had to be cancelled. Six members of the Sussex Area attended. As the course was held in Northern Ireland the majority of delegates had to travel to the venue involving planes, boats and cars or coaches to arrive between 2 and 4 in the afternoon.

On arrival we were greeted by the Staff of Dromantine to receive our accommodation details and from Joan Magee (*Chairman of the National Judges Committee*) a lovely goodie bag.

After dropping off our bags in our rooms we were greeted with a most welcome cup of tea and scones. It was a perfect chance to catch up with other delegates as they arrived. Next as you would expect a bit of a test... There was a vase containing a range of plants for us to identify. Next two tables contained a series of artefacts from different periods of history. Again we had to identify and record which period of history they represented. In our goody bag was a Horticultural Quiz. Once completed everything had to be handed in and marked, would you expect less?

After supper we had a Gin and Vodka tasting from a local distillery called '*Tasting the Botanicals*'. Small tasting glasses were distributed and the tasting began. Lots of information regarding the production of said products. The noise level in the room grew as the evening progressed.

Next day after breakfast we all congregated for the morning session with Margaret Rumens entitled 'Pedestals'. Margaret introduced the session by explaining the changes made in the New Competitions Manual 2023 to the definition of Pedestal. We looked at a series of photographs and judged which conformed to pedestal designs. The National Judges committee and Judges from Northern Ireland had prepared 9 superb pedestal style designs for us to judge. Were they pedestals or not? Mid-morning we had a refreshing coffee break.

After which we judged individually the pedestals and then an Area Judge was partnered with a National Judge to discuss their findings, then a group discussion where everyone aired their views. A very valuable exercise into what constitutes a pedestal.

After lunch the next session was taken by Alan Beatty on Still Life. A brief discussion on the amendments that had been made in the new Competitions Manual 2023. The delegates were split into groups of 3 and we had to judge the 7 exhibits of Still Life again set up by the National Judging Committee and Irish National Judges. Awarding First, Second, Third and VHC.

After the coffee break we had to write comments cards in our groups for our VHC and a non prize winner. These were then discussed. After this, three of the still life designs were rearranged in 10 minutes. This followed by the next three rearranged. Group discussions then took place to decide if they were better after highlighting the changes in the new manual.

The evening meal was a four course dinner with a glass of wine which was much needed after the work that had been carried out. The meal was very enjoyable and tasty.

The evening's entertainment was a talk by Karen Frew about the life of Dior. A very informative evening.

After breakfast we had to vacate our rooms by 9.30 and the final session of the course was an Open forum to include the new competitions Manual 2023. Lots of questions were raised which were answered by the committee. This

continued with more questions after the coffee break. The conference was brought to a close with the announcing of the results of the Plant

ID, Horticultural Quiz and What period were the artefacts representing. Our own Linda Porrett won the last competition.

This was followed by Lunch. Our coach picked us up and return us to the airport for our homeward journey.

A very enjoyable relaxed conference. We made new friends, caught up with old ones, and gained a lot of

knowledge about the new Competitions Manual 2023

An important guide to many of the changes to the Manual, a copy of this booklet is available from NAFAS HQ and Area publications. It is recommended that this should be read in full by all Judges and Competitors. Please do not reference the old 2015 (green) manual.

Notes for Competitors -It is advised that all competitors should purchase the new Competitions Manual Fourth Edition 2023 and read it to help them with competing.

Early next year, we will be running a day to go through the changes to the manual in greater depth. In the meantime to help competitors for the up and coming Sussex Area Competitions, some of the major amendments are listed below.

The Competitions Manual 2023 has been reordered and the script condensed in places to make it more concise and some of the definitions have minor amendments.


We recommend you reading the new manual but have highlighted major amendments below:-

P6-8 – Plant Material - new definitions added – Manipulated Plant Material Plant Material in all its Forms Wild Plant Material.

P10 – Guidance For Competitors – 4 New Bullet Points (BP) have been added, PLEASE read the complete list

P11 – Common Faults in Show Work – BP2 wording 'Current edition' added

P13 – Terms and Definitions for Show Schedules – New title



P14-19 - Styles of Exhibit
There is now no section for Contemporary
Design and these previous definitions have
been incorporated into either Styles of Exhibit or
Design Techniques.

Some of the definitions in Styles of Exhibit have amended or have extra BPs, PLEASE read all carefully.

New definitions-Meadow Modern Mass Pave/Tapestry Steam Punk

P22, - Period Classes 2 new periods— Indian Japanese

P24-27 - Design Techniques New definitions – Baling, Braiding/ Plaiting, Dying/Painting, Palisading

Some definitions have new BPs and others have been condensed PLEASE read all definitions carefully.

P31 – Elements of Design Definitions have been condensed, PLEASE read one of the recommended books for a fuller explanation, to give you a greater understanding.

Club Newswhat have you been up to?

On the Radio

As **East Grinstead Flower Club** new club year was approaching in September and given the fact that radio still maintains a strong and vital presence within the media industry, I decided to get in touch with the managing director of the local radio station (Meridian FM) in East Grinstead whom I'd met on a few occasions. My intention was to get a plug on any of the programmes being broadcast that week and have our event posted on their social network platforms. The main advantage of radio is that it's an anywhere, anytime medium and that accessibility enables listening to occur in places that other media may have difficulty reaching, for example when driving.

That email quickly led to one of the male presenters asking if I'd do a live or a zoom interview. This unexpected proposition threw me a bit but I decided to bite the bullet and go for it! After all, nothing ventured, nothing gained!

Having opted to go 'live' I requested a list of some possible questions my host might ask and then prepared myself as best I could. This included making some notes with a few keywords highlighted to jog my memory and some factual data about NAFAS and Sussex Area. Just because you know what you want to say in your head doesn't mean you'll always remember, especially when live on air as I found out!

It's best to appear natural, spontaneous and unrehearsed but this is easier said than done! I was given the option of choosing in advance some music I'd like played during the programme. This, plus the necessary ads, one





a break and an opportunity to scan one's notes! It's surprising how quickly the time goes by.

The tip I'd give anyone wishing to do a radio interview is to treat it as if it were a chat around your kitchen table. It can be a bit daunting seeing the studio with all the mikes, wires and equipment in a small area but it's best to forget about them completely. One can always take another club / committee member along if going it alone is too much of an undertaking. That will also add a bit more variety.

Speak slowly and clearly and be precise about what information you'd like to get across - what the club actually does, the benefits of being in a flower club, what a typical evening consists of, where exactly and at what time you meet - give the postcode - whether you have refreshments / raffle / sales table, complimentary / reduced entry on the first visit and so on. It's also important to stress that no previous experience is necessary to attend. Mention social events and club and area workshops that take place during the year and basically anything the club does that would interest and entice new members

I brought along two small, simple arrangements in ribboned jam jars for the studio so that became a topic of conversation on air which led on to pointers on how to keep flowers fresher for longer at home. Be prepared to go 'off piste' at times when the conversation just flows.

Get there early as this gives you a chance to meet the presenter for a wee chat and to familiarise yourself with the layout of the place and get comfortable. It's normal to be a bit nervous! Bring a bottle of water in case you get a dry mouth. Remember that listeners will tune in at different times so repeat your main messages articulating them in different ways during each segment. I actually forgot to do this but the experienced presenter stepped in and guided me to it again. If you make a mistake don't dwell on it. Just keep going!

Whilst I can usually talk for Ireland, live radio interviews wouldn't be my forte, but having done a few over the years on different topics during my teaching career it gets a little easier and is definitely well worth the publicity for our clubs.

Overall I was pleased I got through it even if I felt afterwards I could've done better! So if you get the opportunity to promote your club on radio, go for it!

Paper Flower Workshop

East Preston Floral Club were treated to a very special evening in July when the very talented Duncan Ward came along to show us how to make paper flowers. Initially, there was a slight air of trepidation in the room at the sight



of such a diverse selection of equipment – heaps of different coloured card, tissue paper, sticks, wires and the inevitable PVA glue and some of us felt like we were back in playschool, but we needn't have worried as Duncan reassured us that it was all very simple and straightforward!

So, starting with a few sheets of delicate tissue paper, Duncan skilfully demonstrated how to make a very pretty carnation. We folded our tissue paper according to his instructions, backwards and forwards, pleating the paper as we went, then snipped into the ends with our scissors before gently teasing the delicate tissue apart with our fingertips. It took a while to perfect the art, but we all finished up with a prettily frilled paper tissue carnation – how clever!

Our next challenge under Duncan's expert guidance was to make a paper rose. This time the coloured paper was thicker so we all



thought it might be easier. How wrong can you be! After cutting out various

petal shapes and lining them all up in front of us, mentally numbering them as we went, we then had to assemble the petals in a very specific order, before curling each one over a kebab stick to create the natural effect of a beautiful rose. The results looked stunning (mostly)!



Then came the grand finale – *Kusudama* - a paper flower extraordinaire! We were each invited to choose a pack of multi-coloured squares of paper and then we were asked to watch very carefully as Duncan showed us how it was done. Well, it looked easy enough but, once again, how wrong can one be! We fiddled and faffed, got glue all over the table and up our arms, put bits in upside down and back to front,



until Duncan
patiently came
along and offered
his expert help to
put it all right. The
results were
spectacular and it
was certainly worth
persevering with
the challenge!

We had such a great evening, and we learned something completely new which we can now incorporate into our floral designs from time to time. For my book choice, I am choosing 'Washington Black' by Esi Edugan winner of the Man Booker prize in 2018 described as 'Strong, beautiful and



beguiling' by Observer. It is a tale about goings on at a Barbados Plantation. 
